ups and downs but he remained humorous, attentive and loving to his wife, Ruth. He relished the greetings and remembrances from his St. Luke's family, thanks in part to granddaughter Olivia's project to present him with a special scrapbook. He died on April 13, 2018 at 96 years of age. ¹His memorial service was held at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, April 22, 2018 at Trinity Episcopal Church, Route 263, in Solebury, PA, followed by a reception at the church. Highlights of April Vestry Meeting

• **Hospitality** was the focus of the April Vestry meeting, and there certainly was a great deal of that recently between Lent and Holy Week. Janet Hunter read a report from Bonnie Watters detailing events, such as the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on February 13 (23 attendees, same as last year, with donations to go to the Episcopal Relief & Development Fund) and the Seder Meal on March 28 (40 attendees, including 5 children and many guests, with donations to go to Kids4Peace). Anne Goodreau's piano playing at that event was a treat. Janet feels hospitality extends beyond actual events because of the welcoming nature of parishioners and their willingness to pitch in providing food. Other successful examples included the enhanced Easter coffee hour and the Foyer Dinner at the Careys' house. The next big event is the annual August Supper. Bonnie Watters is already researching a free tent. At the Annual Meeting Marjorie Carey, Janet Hunter, Bonnie Watters, Eileen Widger, and Anita Wright volunteered to be on the Committee. A Chairman is needed now, and the committee will likely meet in June to begin organizing. Lew Watters will head up the Silent Auction and ask Sean Buchanan to team up again with him.

• **Treasurer's Report. Accounting:** Treasurer John DesLauriers is making some adjustments. The Seder donations for Kids4Peace should be a pass-through item, not income from a fundraiser. The LEGO donation to Whiting Library is the \$100 listed under Outreach. **Special Music Supplies.** The recent \$122 expenditure is for the annual copyright license that allows music to be copied from the hymnal. Recent music purchased for Holy Week was wonderful, but has almost depleted that budget allocation for the year. **Vanguard Fund.** John, Belinda Whipple Worth, and Jane Davis are now authorized Trustees to deal with Vanguard.

• **Junior Warden's Report: Microphones.** Andrew Pennell is working with Heidi to counteract the feedback problem, and new instructions are being provided by Lew Watters to educate those who use the devices. **Spring Grounds Cleanup.** The chosen date is Sunday **May 6**, after the 10:00 a.m. service. Parishioners should dress casually and bring rakes and other tools to improve the grounds. Lunch will be provided afterward to celebrate the annual spring cleaning.

• **Rector's Report. Two-Week Break.** Rev. Heidi will be away the afternoon of April 22-May 8 and will miss two Sundays. Belinda will lead Morning Prayer with music on April 29, and Rev. Jim Kowalski and Rev. Anne Brewer will be supply priests on May 6, 2018.

• **Mutual Ministry Review and Vestry Retreat on June 16.** Lynn Bates from the Diocese will lead the review in the

morning, followed by lunch and the retreat. The review will focus on where St. Luke's has been for the past year, analyzing what has been accomplished and what needs improvement. The afternoon's retreat focus will be on where St. Luke's is going with an aging and shrinking parish. Janet Hunter will ask Gethsemane in Proctorsville if we may again use its facility for the events with a true potluck dinner for spouses/partners on Friday evening and then simple breakfast and lunch on Saturday for the review and retreat.

• **Campaigns: "Upon This Rock" Parish Partnership Campaign for Rock Point:** The Vestry voted to allot the non-pledge income on Sunday, April 22 to the Rock Point Partnership Campaign with a minimum of \$100 to be sent if the designated collection that day is less. **Episcopal Relief & Development Fund:** Heidi will seek handouts or inserts for future bulletins regarding the organization and its projects.

• **St. Luke's 150th Anniversary:** At the Annual Meeting, Daniel Loraditch offered to chair a committee (Bonnie and Lew Watters and Pat Fromberger so far) to devise appropriate celebrations over the 3-year period that St. Luke's was formed and built. Others are encouraged to join the committee, and the Watters have included information on the bulletin board to spark interest and participation.

• **Next Regular Vestry Meeting:** (second Wednesday): May 9, 2018. The Focus topic is "Christian Education."

PINS Donates Easter Dinners To Four Families

For the Springtime in past years the PINS (Partners in Service) committee has prepared Easter dinners and Easter baskets for 3-4 families in crisis. This year Robbie Wierzbicki, our liaison at the Department of Child and Family Services in Springfield, identified four families who would benefit with donations from us.

So, off to extensive shopping trips for ham dinners with sides and dessert, items for 2 other dinners, and some food staples such as cereals, juice, peanut butter, jelly, etc. There were a total of 17 kids in those families with ages from 1-17 years. Each child would receive an Easter basket with toys appropriate for his/her age. We bought a little candy, but filled those baskets with crayons, pencils, activity books, card games, balls, chalk, toy cars, stuffed animals, plus lots of other items kids would enjoy. 13 boxes all labeled for the individual families were delivered to Robbie in time for the case workers to deliver to these families. The total spent came to \$718.41.

PINS is a vehicle for putting faith in action. The program allows social workers to voice the needs of the children in their caseloads; youngsters who are only too familiar with pain and suffering. These interactions and gifts relay a message that we have faith in them, they are capable of achieving goals and they and their families are valuable people.

Meals On Wheels Of Greater Springfield



Meals on Wheels of Greater Springfield is an organization that delivers daily hot meals to homebound people in the towns of Springfield, Chester, Andover, Wethersfield,

Baltimore and Windham. They are currently serving delivering 140 hot meals daily as well as serving 20 meals a day in the home kitchen at 197 Union Street, Springfield. Frozen meals are also available to cover weekend needs. There are currently 30 people in Chester receiving home delivered meals.

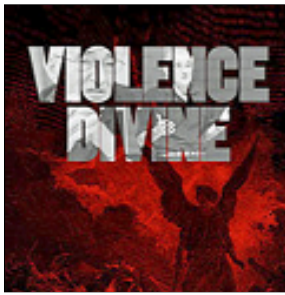
In order to be eligible for Meals on Wheels, a person must be 60 years of age or older, and either be incapacitated by illness or advanced age, or be nutritionally at risk (unable to purchase or prepare adequate meals). One applies for Meals on Wheels through its umbrella organization, Senior Solutions, 139 Main Street, Springfield 885-2655. Or, one can apply through the Council on Aging 885-5879.

All of the drivers who deliver food to homes are volunteers from the communities they serve. Recipients are asked to make a voluntary contribution of \$4.00 per meal, but no one is denied for lack of ability to contribute. Despite support from town, state and federal programs, Meals on Wheels is constantly fundraising to try to meet their costs. The money that independent groups, like St. Luke's, give are greatly needed and appreciated.

Most of the information for this article came through conversations with Maria Contro and Nancy Lindsay. Marie, who some of you may remember from the days of our free Monday night suppers, and other church events, is now, at ninety, the treasurer of the executive board and in charge of fundraising for Meals on Wheels of Greater Springfield. Nancy and Bill Lindsay are volunteer drivers. Meals on Wheels is always in need of volunteers to deliver meals to home bound recipients as well as to work in the kitchen. Nancy said that she really looks forward to her delivery days, checking on and visiting with the folks on her route. Here is another great volunteer opportunity and another deserving organization that St. Luke's Outreach funds support.

Adult Formation For Spring: John Dominic Crossan DVD Series



Spring is here! For our Spring and early summer Study program here at St. Luke's, our Mid-Week Adult Formation group will be engaging in a study about the role violence plays in the Judeo-Christian world. In learning about and discussing the biblical stories in which violence features, we will discover the impact divine violence has in our own understanding of the Christian faith. Our Study will feature a DVD series entitled: "Violence Divine: Overcoming the Bible's

Betrayal of Its Non-Violent God." Each 40-minute segment will be followed by a short group discussion. To give you just a taste of what to expect, I offer you two of the segment titles: "The Heart of the Torah" and "Undecided Justice."

The DVD series is moderated and led by one of the world's foremost historical Jesus scholars, John Dominic Crossan. Prof. Emeritus Crossan bases his DVD lectures on one of his books, *How to Read the Bible and Still be a Christian: Struggling with Divine Violence from Genesis through Revelation*.

We'll begin on the **9th of May** beginning at 10:30 a.m. and ending by 11:45 a.m. Please invite a friend or two to join us! Each Session is stand-alone. All are welcomed to participate. Contact me with any questions you may have.

Footnote: John Dominic Crossan, professor emeritus at DePaul University, is an Irish-American New Testament scholar. He is an historian of early Christianity and also a former Catholic priest. As a scholar, his research has focused on the historical Jesus and on the Ancient Mediterranean and New Testament worlds. Known by some as controversial in his theological worldview, Crossan describes Jesus' ministry on earth as one of peace and non-violence. Jesus' time on earth, according to Crossan, stressed open healings and communal-style meals over that of attention given to the social hierarchies of the Jewish culture and the Roman Empire as recorded in the gospels.

We have completed 1/4 of 2018, so income and expenses to date should be 25% of budget. As you can see Pledge & Plate income is right on target (thank-you!), and Expenses are slightly under budget to date. In March we received quarterly interest payments from Raymond James (rectory sale investment), and our Vanguard investments making the month show a positive income of \$2,441 and our YTD, as expected, much more in line with budget than noted in the last report. —*John DesLauriers, Treasurer*
