- Sean will tackle Sunday, May 4 with the lesson "The Road of Emmaus." The children are memorizing their prayer and singing joyfully. Nonetheless, there are ways to share these stories and Ashley and Sean are refining their teaching methods.

After her sharing the children might photograph or write a little piece about what they love about church school for LITS. - Polly Montgomery will take weeks three (May 18; lesson TBA) and week four (May 25, Rogation Sunday.) Planting a bush or tree might be a rewarding project. Bonnie will look into that with Polly and our gardeners.
- June 8, Pentecost, will be our last Sunday until fall. Child care senior Margie DesLauriers will be heading to college, and we look to adding Rachel Guerra to the Anderson team in the new school year. It is all working and the team is to be applauded.

# Next Steps In Our Search For A Rector

May 14 will find the Ministry Discernment Committee in a Portfolio Review meeting over dinner with Bishop Ely, Canon Bates and our Vestry. We will be listening to comments and suggestions toward finalizing our OTM (Office of Transition Ministry) Portfolio, which has been under review by the Bishop since February.



Then, on Sunday afternoon May 18, MDC will gather off site at Newsbank Conference Center to re-establish and affirm our connections, commitments and our purpose going forward. Our Diocesan Companion, Ann Cooper, will again be joining us for this important meeting, along with a guest facilitator from the Diocese. We will be processing the comments and suggestions we heard on May 14th regarding our OTM Portfolio in order to finalize that document to be sent on to our Vestry for its final approval. Then it will be posted on line on the Episcopal Church Office for Transition Ministry website. MDC members will also be looking into how we select and interview prospective candidates. Our new task is not just reviewing approved names submitted by Canon Lynn Bates. We will be looking into expectant hearts and minds and souls, men and women, young and old. All the good and sometimes difficult work we have been doing is about to come to fruition!

# A St. Luke's Profile—Meet The Hensel-Whalen Family

One of the beautiful things about my writing profiles of our members is that no matter how well I think I know someone, I am always refreshed and enlightened. Lew and I have known Sean Whalen for 31 years, Ashley maybe five years. Not a surprise I would learn there are some commonalities about them. No wonder they are sharing life together with their three little treasures.

Sean was born in Fullerton, CA in 1971, the oldest of three brothers. Erin is married with a little

daughter and lives in the hills above Palo Alto, and Ben, the youngest, was baptized and married at St. Luke's and he and Barbara live in Chester and have little Porter, now two. Ashley was born at Mary Hitchcock in 1985 and has two sisters and three brothers, some living nearby and some in Arizona. Kathleen, the Whalen boys' mother, moved to Vermont without knowing a soul in 1982, established herself in a business and followed Sean to St. Luke's! Many dedicated themselves to caring for her in her battle with cancer that ended in 2006.

Two mentors for Sean were Dick Bliss, the headmaster of the East Hill School, and then Rector Andy Osmun. Sean shared "questions of how to walk with God; ups and downs of community life; the reality, on farms, of relying on the business ends of animals; the works of Shakespeare and Sigmund Freud; how to work" were all consuming on his journey in his youth and he has never forgotten the influence of these men.

Ashley, I come to learn had a similar educational path—changed by life for two years at an unconventional school, the Park Farm School in Springfield, which was not unlike East Hill. She and her peers worked a farm, learned to hang-glide and built a rope-tow for skiing up on Skitchewaug Trail. She has been dancing since age three. Ashley's grandparents moved up from Massachusetts around this time Again, their bond is strengthened by their educations. East Hill closed in 1989 and Sean went on to Middlesex School in Concord, MA., but the influence of East Hill wouldn't die. On a platform of something like "More Cows, Less Classes!" he got to be School President at Middlesex and then went on to Harvard with more of the same. Sean



went into teaching after college, first at a private school in Bogota, Colombia and thereafter as a substitute teacher hoping to get hired. Ashley first met Sean when he was the substitute teacher in her American Studies class at SHS; but the sparks didn't fly until some seven years later when they were both substitute teaching at Gateway, which was what might be called a "reform school" for troubled kids. From 2001 through 2008 Sean worked on Lydia Ratcliff's farm in Andover and deliv-

ered whole animal carcasses around Manhattan.

Ashley's family settled in Cavendish and she pursued her career as a dancer while studying at Green Mountain and then graduating from Springfield High School. She attended Interlochen Arts Camp in Michigan during the summers. Ashley took her degree at Hampshire College in 2006, graduating ahead of time. She went on to earn a Master's in Arts in Education at Harvard in 2008 and returned to teach in Springfield. Ashley teaches dance in public schools throughout New England and has been involved in a variety of community arts projects as a dance artist. She choreographs for the Opera Theatre of Weston in the winters and teaches ballet, modern and hip-hop classes at the Dance Factory in Springfield. Now the family farms together, raising sheep, goats and chickens, growing a garden that sustains them pretty well, foraging for wild berries and mushrooms and making good crops of hay and cider. They are totally engaged by their three sweet children: Aurora, born 8/3/10; Saul, 5/25/12; Leona, 9/28/13. These bright, beautiful babes keep them curious, engaged, and empathetic in their lives. We all love their engagement too! Sean is delighted to have Ashley by his side in the church school setting sharing his music and faith and seeing her learn more and share in her special way.

Most poignant are Sean's memories of his faith journey at St. Luke's and who those influences and models were besides Andy and Dick. He likened it to the final scene of "Places in the Heart." They are all there. Here is his personal scene: "Susan Klein whipping the full choir along, working the pipe organ with her whole body; Jim Aspden's deep voice so unerring in all the bass parts; Scott Spaulding;

Stan Richardson jingling the change in his pockets and his wife Laura elbowing him on account of it, week after week; people with pure love in their hearts, like Mary Henry, and you could put a lot of others in that category, like Bob and Betty Lamb, or Mary Milanesi, and others; big Walt Huebner and his JESUS SAVES belt buckle; Helen Aspden watching the acolytes ever so closely; the Ballou girls; Marc DesLauriers as a newborn with a perfect little oldman face; the sisters Freddie Holden and Janice Fielder; the Robinsons; the deaths of little Riley Bourgois and little David Schwartz. Big raucous youth group dinners with Bonnie and Lew. Babysitting for groups of young church families who wouldn't come home from dinner til past 11. The Freemans. The Bach Cantata led by Blanche Moyse. But we do."

And it is safe and beautiful place. We are blessed to have Sean, Ashley and their children in that place.

They will disappear to the Weathersfield Center church with family roots for the summer, but we will have them back in the fall. Be sure. —*Bonnie Watters*

# **Highlights of April Vestry Meeting**

The April 14 Vestry Meeting was held directly following the Monday Holy Week Communion Service.

**Focus Topic:** Fellowship. Bonnie & Lew Watters reported on the events of the past year. Her detailed report is available in the Vestry Minutes Book at the church office. The "Red Door Track Card" distributed at the ecumenical service brought new people to the Seder. Upcoming events include the Saturday Night "Astronomy Dinner" on May 17 with Claudio Veliz and the Newcomers Progressive Dinner on the first Friday in June. Fellowship updates have been made on the website, and visitors to the site have almost doubled since the beginning of the year.

Financial Report: New Treasurer, Bonnie Johnson, has reported that finances are in pretty good shape. She is still trying to get the financial figures in an easily readable form without having to translate them into Excel format. Electrolux: Approval was given to Lew Watters to spend up to \$200 to purchase a used or reconditioned Electrolux vacuum. Audit Committee: One additional member is needed (no accounting experience necessary) to join Richard Crocker and Red Johnson. Any interested volunteer can contact Richard to discover the details of the commitment.

**Junior Wardens Report:** Andrew Pennell over the next six weeks will seek bids for exterior trim repair and painting. A possible Butterfield Loan from the Diocese or grant funds (Partners in Sacred Buildings, Preservation Trust, or Historical Society) may be investigated.

**Community Meal:** St. Luke's will be the host facility for this monthly free luncheon for the community on Saturday, May 31 in Willard Hall. Jane Davis is coordinating the details with the outside committee that will prepare the food, which is donated, and take care of the arrangements. Usually 35-40 people attend from the public.

**Vestry Meetings:** The third week in May will be a busy one for the Vestry. On May 14, the Vestry and Ministry Discernment Committee will meet with the Bishop and Transition Minister to discuss the parish profile that will be publicized to interested clergy and to give an update on the timing and process. The annual Vestry Retreat will take place on May 16 and 17. The next regular Vestry Meeting will be on June 9. Focus will be "Christian Formation."

### **PINS Assists Families At Easter**

The social workers at the Springfield Department of Child and Family Services identified 3 families who would benefit from an Easter dinner, boxes of food staples and Easter baskets for the kids. Of the 3 families, 2 are headed by grandparents caring for their grandchildren. In all there were a total of 9 kids ranging in age from 3 to 13 years of age. The Easter pails (we thought pails would be more useful than the traditional baskets) were chock full of toys and activities appropriate for the age of each child. We did include a small amount of candy for the season.

Assisting 3 needy families at Easter time is an annual project of PINS (Partners in Service) and is well received by the social workers in Springfield. At the end of the first quarter of the year, I'm beginning to feel like I'm getting a handle on this position and I look forward to getting into a routine with it. I've spent quite a bit of time doing some legal paperwork that needed to be done for our tax status and also getting things set up with a payroll service which will be taking care of not only payroll for our employees but also all of the associated tax filings that are required.

The figures that I've provided above show that we are in good shape and are right on target for where we should be. Our income shows a little more than a quarter of the budgeted amount has been received and, even better, our expenses are just under 20% rather than 25%. With that said, we still can't let down our guard because there is a \$22,000 deficit in the budget. I am confident that we will be able to make this work but we all need to be as generous as we can be, and keep our pledges up to date. Thank you for your help.—*Bonnie Johnson, Treasurer*
