Hands. We send people forth from our midst, if they must go, with prayer and committing them to God's care and protection. The Vestry gathers to fulfill its duty as the managers of the parish, but always opening and concluding with and in prayer. And as the choir gathers to rehearse, on Sunday mornings, and on other occasions, they finish each rehearsal with prayer. I haven't seen any other parish that does this.

Out of this Center in prayer came the Discernment Prayer that we have prayed at each of our Eucharists. As soon as the Vestry knew that we were entering a search process for a new Rector the first thing they wanted to do was prepare a prayer that would hold us and guide us through the process. Yes, it has taken time, perhaps more than we might have wished for, but through it all we have been centered in prayer.

We have prayed that God has a priest for us, and we are the people for this priest. I kept reminding the Committee and Vestry that we aren't searching for an "employee" or a director of a non-profit. A more apt image for the relationship of the pastor (Rector) and people is that of a marriage—a relationship between priest and parish. Also I have in the forefront of my mind Bishop Theuner's admonition to me when I went to Epiphany, Newport, NH years ago, as Priest-in-Charge... "You are to love the people." This is the call to the clergy... and the call to the congregation is to support the clergy. This is what it is to be in relationship, priest and parish.

Our Discernment Prayer also asks that we be blessed with wisdom and patience, that we be open to new thoughts and possibilities (something that is tough for me to do), and that we be unified in our choices and decisions. We are now excited about the new ministry and gifts that we share together, and to see where this journey in Christ takes us.

So, as we move forward over the next few weeks and months, know that indeed Jesus Christ, who is the journey and the journey's end, is with us and holding us in His hands, and that God the Father has indeed prepared a priest for us and us for a priest. Thanks be to God

The Epiphany...One Of The Oldest **Christian Feasts**



The Feast of the Epiphany of ■ Our Lord Jesus Christ is one of the oldest Christian feasts, though, throughout the centuries, it has celebrated a variety of things. Epiphany comes from a Greek verb meaning "to reveal," and all of the various events celebrated by the Feast of the Epiphany are revelations of Christ to man. Epiphany is the

climax of the Christmas Season and the Twelve Days of Christmas, which are counted from December 25th until January 5th. The day before Epiphany is the twelfth day of Christmas, and is sometimes called Twelfth Night, an occasion for feasting in some cultures. As with most aspects of the Christian liturgical calendar, Epiphany has theological significance as a teaching tool in the church. The Wise Men (the Magi) who brought gifts to the infant Jesus were the first Gentiles to acknowledge Jesus as "King" and so were the first to "show" or "reveal" Jesus to a wider world as the incarnate Christ. This act of worship by the Magi, which corresponded to Simeon's blessing that this child Jesus would be "a light for revelation to the Gentiles" (Luke 2:32), was one of the first indications that Jesus came for all people, of all nations, of all races, and that the work of God in the world would not be limited to only a few.

At St. Luke's Church we will observe The Epiphany of Our Lord Jesus Christ on Tuesday, January 6 with a service of Holy Eucharist, Rite II at 6:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. We invite you to join in this special celebration.

The Christmas Tea and Sale was an outstanding success **1** in many ways including adding much needed funds to St. Luke's end of year income. Held on December 6, the morning began with a downpour of rain that continued falling throughout the day—certainly not a very "Christmassy feeling"—but that didn't seem to dampen people's spirits. We had a steady stream of happy customers throughout the day from mid-morning and into the early afternoon. It is always fun to see and greet faithful customers who return each year...some traveling from out of state to attend the Tea. This event is really about fellowship, spreading a feeling of warmth and friendship, and reaching out to the community. Looking at the smiling faces, listening to the joyous conversations and just feeling the exuberance, pulsating throughout the room, tells us it was a success! To quote what our Interim Rector, Thad (who incidentally was one of the tea pourers) said at the end of the day...and I am paraphrasing a bit... "Do people know what a great deal this is? A bountiful lunch, fun and great conversation all for only \$6.00!!!"

By the end of the afternoon, we had served 68 tea buffet customers and had sold most of our handmade crafts and baked holiday goods, to add about \$2100.00 to St. Luke's revenues. Surprisingly, Grandma's Attic bargain room did not fair as well this year. We may need to rethink whether we want to continue it another year. One suggestion has been to turn it into a "Santa's Workshop" room with items especially for children to purchase. We welcome your feedback on this idea or other suggestions you might have.

As always we are very grateful to the dedicated crew of workers who help to organize and carry out this major fundraising effort each year. We name just a few key persons here: A huge thank you to Jane Davis & Jean Hancock, who headed up a fantastic kitchen team; to Marcia Clinton & Eileen Widger, who organized and ran Grandma's Attic; to Sally Hoover, "queen" of the baked goods table and to Cyrena Goodrich and her niece "Emma," who handled craft table sales. A special thank you to our two young servers, Sophia Buchanan and Wyatt Hugg, who kept the cookies and other goodies flowing to all the tables. Red Johnson was our cashier and greeted guests as they entered Willard Hall. And finally, a heartfelt thank you to all members of the parish who helped in so many ways, from donating foods, baking goodies, crafting items, working at the tea, setting up, cleaning up—to coming out to support this event.



- 4. I encourage you to be attentive to the exhaustion that you—leaders and the whole community—are experiencing. Be sure to care for yourselves; do not try to do too much; give thanks and praise for the work of the members of the vestry and the MDC.
- 5. Your pastoral care for members of the St. Luke's community is amazing.
- 6. Opportunities for Christian Adult Education will deepen the faith and ministry of the people of St. Luke's. Just the brief work we did on the Lord's Prayer, worship language and lector training shows your eagerness to engage topics and one another in learning.
- 7. You have two events that just blew me away: The August Supper and the Christmas Tea. They are the best kept secrets in the greater Chester area. They are also amazing opportunities for evangelism, easing people into the worshipping community and being amazing neighbors in Chester. Build upon them for the future.

Again, my thanks to you for inviting me into your mix, being willing to stretch and trying some new things together. May you continue to find God working in your midst as you move into a new phase of ministry with new leadership, both lay and ordained. I'll hold you and Heidi in my prayers in the months to come.

Presence In The Healing Ministry

The Seasons of Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas create a wonderful time of celebration both in our church and in our homes. They are not always easy seasons for everyone. There is sadness connected to these times, as well as great joy. There are pressures from the secular, commercial world, and there are moments of welcome peace and goodwill and generosity.

The Healing Ministry of the church is important in every season. The prayers offered for people who choose to come are not solutions to problems. This is not counseling, or even "off the cuff" good advice. The prayers simply acknowledge the centrality of Christ, God's presence, at all times, no matter what is happening in our lives—be it good or difficult. Human nature being what it is, we often experience a kind of hesitancy, a difficulty in finding words, when we face issues in need of healing—or even those times when our relief and joy exceed our words. We have the opportunity on a Sunday morning to be with others, in the laying-on-of-hands and in prayer, to let others know where we are, and ask them to speak of God's closeness and infinite caring.

These Seasons of Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas give us the essence of the healing ministry. Every prayer of healing is a thanksgiving for God's presence. That's the beginning of healing: to know we are found, to know we are not alone. We give thanks, even if it needs to be through the words of another person on this particular day, in this community, which gives thanks again and again.

And then every prayer of healing is an Advent prayer of waiting, of expectation for what will be, because of God's love and caring for us. There is much unknown, as there is in Advent, as there is in all of life. What is known, as we wait, is that God comes to us—the Father rushing

Having a ¾-time priest is going to cost the parish more than we've been paying, especially for the required health and dental insurance. We don't want to reduce funding for any programs, but need to be able to fund the budget.
