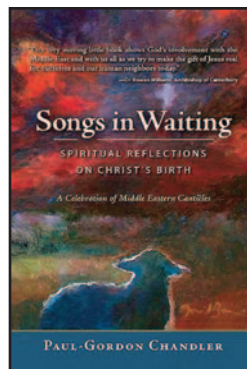
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become more acute to seeing what is around me. Recognizing this change energizes me in my spirit. Maybe you, too, have a story or two to share about your experience of renewal, as well.

Beginning the week of Advent that starts on November 29th, St. Luke's will be offering a Zoom study from a book by Paul-Gordon Chandler entitled: "Songs in Waiting: Spiritual Reflections on Christ's Birth." Copyrighted in 2009, this small book explores a few of the Middle-Eastern Canticles that speak of Advent and Christ's birth. These Canticles ("Song of May", "Song of Zechariah", and others) are featured in the Book of Common Prayer that we sometimes recite at worship.

“We Gather Together To Ask The Lord’s Blessing.”



At this time of year as the weather and leaves turn a little crispy, I find myself singing “We Gather Together to Ask the Lord’s Blessing.” It’s a favorite from my childhood and one we sang as we enacted at the “Pilgrim’s Progress” yearly in downtown Plimoth (the original spelling), MA at Thanksgiving time. I was always confused by the line, “Sing praises to His Name; He forgets not His own.” It surprised me that we would need to confirm that God didn’t forget his own name!

Turns out, God doesn’t forget His own people!

I was asked to lead the **Stewardship Committee** this year. It’s not anything I’ve ever been drawn to do. Not my “gift,” or how I see myself serving God or His people. But I agreed to consider and pray. I prayed, asking God if I should take on this responsibility. I gave God about twenty seconds, I think, to reply...I felt no sense that I should do this. Certainly heard no words in my head. Or heart. “Whew!! That was a close call! Dodged that one! Alleluia! Alleluia!! Alleluia!!! And hooray!”

But, here I am, writing this letter. How did that happen? I really did know that I hadn’t engaged sufficiently (honestly) either with God or my own inner self. I gave God another chance to speak; I gave myself another chance to listen. I moved (God moved me?) from NO, to a grudging OK, to YES!

I think I’ll use this same process to consider the amount of my pledge. I won’t just look at what I gave last year, and consider that my income will be less this year because I’ve retired(!). I’ll try to listen deeply and I expect I’ll be moved from “NO, the church isn’t even open!” To a grudging “OK, we do need to keep the pipes from freezing.” To “YES, it brings me joy to give!”

What if I give more this year than last year?!

“We all do extol Thee, Thou Leader triumphant

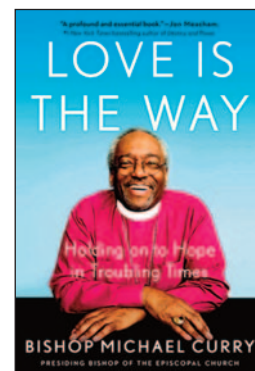

Highlights From The October Vestry Meeting

The October 13 Vestry Meeting was held by Zoom or phone because of the continued Covid-19 restrictions by the Diocese of Vermont.

- **Focus Topic: Worship at St. Luke's.** Outdoor In-Person Worship. Beginning on Sunday, October 18, there will be just one 10:00 a.m. Morning Prayer service, starting with Rite I and alternating on Sundays between Rite I and Rite II until cold weather precludes outdoor worship. **Virtual Zoom Worship.** Heidi will investigate a service of Morning Prayer possibly commencing in November inside the church with music by Anne Goodreau. **Phase IV from the Diocese.** No policy change has been sent that would allow in-person worship. **Potential Christmas Eve Service.** David Carey will seek permission for a possible service on the Village Green with singing, masks, and social distancing.

- **Treasurer's Report:** John DesLauriers reported that decreased daily expenses, vibrant investments, and the anticipated quarterly payment in December from the sale of the rectory will help to offset projected lower income this fall and the requirement to pay an installment on the Diocesan loan in December. **Regarding the PPP,** the National Church will tell the Diocese, which will then tell us, if percentages due to each larger organization are due. Meanwhile, by mid-October, all PPP funds will have been used for payroll, so the bank will let us know when we should apply for grant status. **Audit.** John will set up a meeting of the Audit Committee and may need a Zoom meeting of the Vestry to approve the report. **2021 Budget.** This will need to be a topic for the November Vestry meeting.

- **Restricted Funds.** John is working to accurately reconcile the various restricted funds and their more current values with an easier way to access those funds to pay for appropriate expenses intended to be covered by those funds. The Vestry approved a motion authorizing a transfer action, which John may or may not utilize, as he tries to balance maximizing investment with easier access.

- **Junior Warden's Report: Lamppost.** David Carey has the light to be installed near the parking lot, and John will speak with the Andersons at Medittrina to secure the optimal location.

- **Rector's Report:** Heidi revealed that Lynn Bates will retire from the Diocese at the end of the year after working 25 years there. The one-day Diocesan Convention by Zoom is scheduled for October 31.

- **Stewardship:** John sent in the order for pledge envelopes. NewsBank traditionally prints the pledge cards, and the church printer does the letter. Belinda Whipple Worth

will head the Pledge Drive and get a letterhead from Lillian Willis. David Carey and Janet Hunter will help stuff the letters. The letter and pledge cards should go out in early November, so the traditional In-Gathering may take place the Sunday before Thanksgiving. The Church Directory will be a guide for recipients, as well as people on the email groups or other likely candidates. Belinda will write an article for the November LITS. (See article on page 3)

- **Wreath-Decorating Workshops.** Lillian's wreath supplier is willing to do a minimum of 30 wreaths, but would prefer 40 or won't agree to supply wreaths in 2021. Four smaller wreaths will be ordered for the church doors, but not the big one for inside since no indoor worship is allowed. An increased number of workshops will cut in half the number of participants allowed at each (now maximum 6, plus Lillian) and abide by State guidelines regarding masks and social distancing, with no food served. Set-up will be on Wednesday, November 18 and sessions will take place November 19-21. Information will be sent to Marti Assenza for the website and to Pat Fromberger for LITS.

- **Christmas Market: Culinary Classics & Crafts to Go!** This event will take place on Saturday, December 5, 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m., with pre-order pickup 9:30 -10:00a.m., and with set-up on Friday, December 4. Pre-wrapped and frozen foods, gifts, masks, sanitizers, social distancing with 5 customers, plus volunteers, will be allowed. Two pop-up tents (belonging to the Church and DesLauriers) will be set up on Friday. Customers may wait in their cars, and we will try calling them to let them know when they may enter. Janet Hunter will help outside and direct traffic.

- **Next Vestry Meeting:** Wednesday, November 11, 2020. Focus topic is the 2021 Budget. —*Lillian Willis, Clerk*

Remembering Freddy



Fredericka “Freddy” Holden
January 25, 1927 – January 5, 2020

Freddy will be remembered at St. Luke’s for her cheerful personality, quirky sense of humor and her love for chatting with others after the services. She and her younger sister, Janice, faithfully attended St. Luke’s Church for over 60 years (Freddy 62 years & Janice 69 years) and were affectionately referred to as “The Fair Sisters” by Bonnie Watters. (Bonnie wrote a profile about the two sisters in February 2003 LITS.) The sisters remained the best of friends throughout their lives and were often mistaken for “twins” as they were growing up—despite a 10-year separation in age.

Freddy, the daughter of Frederick and Hazel (Austin) Fair, was born in Bellows Falls in 1927 and moved to Springfield at age two. She spent many happy hours in the company of her great Aunt Minnie, who raised the girls’ mother when grandparents died rather young. Aunt Minnie was like a grandmother. From the one-room school (where her mother and later her sister attended grade school) in West Springfield, Freddy went to Springfield High School. In February of her senior year she began work at Fellows Corporation as a stenographer and secretary for the Purchasing Department. She enjoyed 27 years of employment at Fellows. Freddy met her husband Ray through his future sister-in-law and they married on June 4, 1949 after a two-and-a-half-year courtship. The couple lived in Chester for five years before moving to Pleasant Valley Road in Springfield where they resided for the remainder of their lives. Sadly, Ray predeceased Freddy in November 2014 after 65 years of marriage.

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Freddy, a long-time Episcopalian, became involved at St. Luke’s in 1958. She loved sharing her sister Jannie’s stories of the *Young Peoples Fellowship* that met Sunday afternoons. Mary and Buster Henry would pick everyone up at their homes, take them to church and then pick them all up again Sunday afternoon to attend the meeting and then go sliding or skating. On a rotation basis they would have Bible study at Bellows Falls, Brattleboro, Woodstock and Windsor followed by fellowship. When the Rev. Andrew G. Osmun arrived as a new young priest at St. Luke’s in 1980, Freddy was a great help and support to him. Andrew writes: *“When I arrived at St Luke’s Freddie Holden typed the stencils for the bulletins and newsletters and I would drive over, get them, bring them to the office next to the Rectory kitchen, run them and fold them week by week for church. We saw a lot of each other. She was so patient with a young impatient priest. Thank you, Freddy, for all your years of service to the Lord and the St Luke’s family of faith.”*

Freddy (and Janice) shared a serious love for animals—birds, dogs, cats, and served as committed and compassionate volunteers for the Springfield Area Humane Society for numerous years. She enjoyed writing letters and working outside, especially mowing her lawn. All of us at St. Luke’s will miss this special lady and feel so grateful to have known and loved her over the years. I can just picture her now up in heaven having one of her friendly chats with God.

Fredericka (Freddy) Holden’s Burial Service

Freddy Holden, a long time St. Luke’s member, passed away January 5, 2020 at the age of 92. As her desire was to have a memorial service at St. Luke’s upon her passing, that was impossible due to covid and the fact that St. Luke’s is not able to be open at this time. Her family felt that closure was needed before cold weather set in. On October 3rd, we had a burial service at the family plot in Pleasant View Cemetery in Chester. Our rector, the Rev. Heidi L. Edson, officiated. During the service, two flocks of geese flew over and the sun came out from behind the gray clouds. Very appropriate due to the fact that Freddy supported many animal organizations and St. Luke’s had a pet blessing that weekend. About 50 people were in attendance. Freddy is now at peace.

Worship and The Latest Update On Reopening The Church

We have made it this far as the St. Luke's community outside our buildings. God has been gracious with the fair weather handed to us to be able to continue holding Church outside on our back lawn. Yet, with November upon us and the late autumn that is bringing the much colder weather, I fear our time is soon up for being able to gather in person outdoors.

Plans for continuing our Sunday worship service once the weather becomes too cold are underway. Beginning sometime this month (likely either the 8th or the 15th of November), St. Luke's will begin offering Zoom worship to help meet the needs in our community for our Sunday gatherings. The Zoom worship service will begin at 10:00 a.m. and will end by no later than 10:45 a.m. This is to give those of you the opportunity to continue your routine of worship on other websites. For St. Luke's worship, a "Zoom Invite" will be sent to you each week in advance of the Sunday's worship time.

With regards to any updates from the Diocese for reopening, there is not much new to report at this time. The **Phase 4 Reopening Guidelines** are still in the planning stages according to our liaison person who is involved with this committee for reopening. The major issues stem not from the size of a particular parish, rather they arise from these concerns: 1) inadequate ventilation of our Church buildings and 2) the recent and continuing rise of COVID-19 that is occurring in many of the States including right here in Vermont. The news report that scientists and experts are predicting this third wave of the virus to be as dangerous as the first and second waves.

I know that many of us are growing impatient about returning to our buildings for worship. I understand this frustration and find myself frustrated, as well. At one of our last Clergy Zoom Meetings, I raised the question of a possible timeline for a Phase 4 reopening. Bishop Shannon shared a good perspective on our current situation of our being physically apart at this time. She was reminding us that, by our not physically meeting during the pandemic, we are demonstrating a sacrificial love one to the other. Love would not place people in risk of exposure that being indoors would present.

We live in a culture and period in time that has come to take for granted quick results. It would be worthwhile to ask how long it has been since we have had to wait for things we needed or wanted. Perhaps this is a time of waiting and asking God to show us the ways we can still reach out to others as God's Church in our world. I know, as God's people, we can do this! —Heidi+

September income includes a quarterly payment from the Raymond James Fund (rectory proceeds) which together with above budget pledge and plate, resulted in a positive Net Ordinary Income. Of note, St. Luke’s was awarded a CARES SBA-PPP Loan of \$11,128.15 on May 1st to help cover payroll and other allowed expenses. As we have reached the end of the 24-week allowed period to utilize these funds, I am applying to have the loan converted to a grant. This anticipated grant, as well as reduced expenses, has enabled us to greatly reduce our dependence on endowment funds to date.
