Julian of Norwich.

You have heard me, the preacher writing this notice, you have heard me cite Julian any number of times. Julian of Norwich is the first woman to write in the English language. She did so in the 1400s, God actually revealed Godself to her and through her for all of his creatures, in a series of revelations she wrote down after experiencing them. These Revelations or, as she called them, *shewings*, open us to finding God is really with us! Unbelievably so!

HOW??

- 1. Join our reading group to share the small book, *An Explorers Guide to Julian of Norwich*, by Veronica Mary Rolf. She writes luminously of the world of 14th century England from which Julian wrote, and helps us understand its impact on this ordinary/ extraordinary person. We also read the actual revelations or shewings one at a time. They are short and profound.
- 2. Let me know you wish to join so I can furnish you with a copy and give to you in advance to read an assigned section we will share at our first session.
