The judges' positive comments to each of the participants let the youngsters know what seemed most appealing or impressive to them and emphasized that the judges appreciated all the time, effort, and talent involved in each

The Loss Of My Trees



Until recently, two huge, lush trees graced my Victorian apartment building. The tree in front shaded my second-story kitchen, and the one beside it shaded my third-floor bedroom. The trees gave shade and protection from sun and rain, from constant traffic streaming by, and from the neighbors only a driveway

away. Even in the heat of the summer, my bedroom was always a lovely, cool haven, and the kitchen was deeply shaded in the brutal afternoon sun. The huge tree beside the building came down in a September rainstorm, splitting in two and crashing into the house next door as I cried and wondered if the summer's heat would be unbearable. The ragged, ninefoot stump left behind is ugly. Then the Town tied a sign to the giant tree in front and cut it down to make way for a new power line. The dog and I walked beneath the branches of that tree when we left to run some morning errands. We returned to find only a low, freshly cut stump and a few bits of sawdust, and blinding sunshine reflecting off two sides of the narrow building. I cried again.

How naked the building looks now, taller and somehow vulnerable without the big trees around it. How changed my life seems, hearing dump trucks roar past and rain hammer against the windows and the neighbors next door shouting. My comfortable haven is gone, and I am heartbroken.

It all comes down to faith, doesn't it? I admit that I've been sorely wounded and that I need God's help to heal. I'm praying for courage in the face of dreadful change, which I resent, and the strength to do what needs to be done. I need to give my pain over to Him, and to look forward and think of growth, and grace.

You are all in my prayers, as I hope I'm in yours.

Rector's Resignation And Notes On Transition

As your Senior Warden, I have written to Bishop Ely to officially notify him of Father Paul's resignation. The Vestry will meet soon with the Bishop and Canon Lynn Bates to learn about the complicated and lengthy process, about two years, for calling a new Rector to St. Luke's. Next steps and discussion of the process will be the focus of the Vestry's Annual Retreat on May 18th and 19th.

Father Paul will be with us throughout May, but he will leave for his annual vacation on June 1st. Father Sanford will officiate on Sundays, beginning on June 1st, and we will call a Supply Priest for Sundays when he is not available. Father Paul will return to officiate for a final time at the services on July 1st.

The Vestry voted unanimously to continue Father Paul's salary and benefits through September, as a farewell gift of grateful appreciation and love from the parish for his ten years of service to St. Luke's. Parishioners are also invited to make individual monetary donations towards this farewell gift if they so desire. We will have a special reception following Father Paul's final service at St. Luke's on Sunday, July 1st, sharing our best and his favorite recipes. Be thinking of what you'll contribute.



A Woman of Passion, Marti Assenza... A St. Luke's Profile

Having known Marti Assenza for almost thirty years, I was delighted to see her return full-time to St. Luke's last fall. When I chose to do her story, her answers to my regular old questions took on a real feeling of passion for all that is important to Marti—her upbringing, animals, Girl Scouting, nursing and especially her daughter, Elizabeth. She even has new passions for jewelry making and photography in her retirement. Thankfully one of her most coveted passions is St. Luke's.

Marti was born on November 12, 1943 in Providence, RI to Richard and Mary Stoddard. She holds that special position of middle child between two sisters. The Stoddard

family did a lot of camping. Marti remembers especially a trip at age seven to Fairplay, CO to visit their uncle, a Presbyterian minister. Accompanying them was two sixmonth hold beagle puppies and they camped all along the way. Back home they had a large garden with chickens, ducks, pigeons, turkeys and dogs—the hound variety. The family's outdoor activity turned to boating when her dad bought a cabin cruiser, with Narragansett Bay being their favorite waterway.

Marti was passionate about scouting, beginning as a Brownie through to Senior Scouting. Her dad was the leader of her Mariner Girl Scout troop when she was in high school; they built an ice boat and ran a regatta for all the Sea and Mariner Scouts in R.I. Membership in the Future Nurses and Fencing Clubs filled her activity hours. She would attend the Episcopal Church with her father, even though she was raised a Roman Catholic.

After high school Marti attended the University of Bridgeport in Bridgeport, CT, graduating in 1965 with a BS in Nursing. She shared a sweet story about a kitten she rescued from behind the cafeteria in her freshman year. Ironically she named him "Troubles," for if he were found in their room that is what he would be! Her passion for this animal was so strong that she would go down to Seaside Park to dig sand for a litter box. I connected with this story because I had to give my NYC cat, Flipper, away just like Marti did Troubles.

Marti's first job was in Pediatrics at Montefiore Hospital in the Bronx, where over 14 years she was a staff nurse, then Head Nurse in the Children's Unit, next Head Nurse in the Pediatric ICU, and finally the last five years as Head



Nurse in the Pediatric Outpatient Care Unit. She helped develop the first intensive course for ICU Nurses at the hospital. Marti also spent a year as an agency nurse and worked mostly at Bellevue Hospital on the Pediatric Unit. When she moved to VT she took a break from Nursing until 1991 when she started working for the VNA and worked there in various capacities until her retirement in August 2011. Her two sisters, are also nurses.

In 1976 she married and she and her husband bought a house in Vermont two years later. The marriage ended in divorce in 2007 after sixteen years of separation. Marti contends that the best result of her

marriage was the birth of Elizabeth Marie on November 1, 1981. A month later she and her little passion moved to Vermont permanently. Elizabeth went to Flood Brook School, then for high school to the Long Trail School. Her college years were at Saint Michael's College in Burlington, VT where she majored in Theatre and Education. After graduation she spent a year as a substitute teacher at Manchester Elementary. Elizabeth then moved to Washington, D.C to become a kindergarten teacher.

This proud mother reports that her daughter currently works for the Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital Council as a Field Director and now is a Membership Development Specialist. This year she led the team of

volunteers who planned the Girl Scouts' 100th Anniversary Interfaith Service. The service is at the Washington National Cathedral and The Most Reverend Katherine Jefferts Schori, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church in the United States, is preaching. Like her mom, Elizabeth started in Girl Scouts before she could be a Daisy and continued as a Girl Scout

ever since. She was a counselor at camp for several years and during college was a troop leader. Most recently

Elizabeth was accepted at Union Theological Seminary in the City of New York and will start there in the fall. She hopes to pursue ordination with the Unitarian Universalist Association and at this time is interested in hospital chaplaincy.

In the good old days Marti was an avid skier and spent three winter vacations skiing in Switzerland. One winter she worked at Stratton as a Little Cub Instructor. In her retirement Marti is making jewelry. Her interest began about four years ago; and to perfect her newfound artistic passion, she has taken several courses in jewelry making. She works in Polymer Clay, makes Kiln Glass Cabachons and earrings, Wire Wrapping and Weaving and Chainmaille. Marti and a friend sell at the Londonderry Farmers Market and hope to expand to the Manchester Farmers Market this summer. In her profile picture she wears one of her pieces. She also dabbles in photography and produces a lovely photographic calendar every Christmas with a family theme as gifts. Her 2008 calendar featured lovely lilies in various presentations.

When Elizabeth was three, they visited her cousin in Pennsylvania and she went to Sunday School with him at his church. When they got home to Vermont Elizabeth asked her Mom why they didn't go to church. So Marti and Elizabeth visited St. Luke's. "We were so warmly welcomed that I never visited any other churches." In earlier years Marti was a Sunday School teacher, an usher, a lector and took part in the Alpha Course. "Due to the demands of my job I did not take a very active part at St. Luke's for several years. And now that I am retired, I enjoy getting to know new members and getting back into the church community. One thing that I love about St. Luke's is the warmth and love and acceptance offered to all who walk through the doors." (We have heard that before!)

Like all of us, Marti hopes in this time of transition St. Luke's continues our growth as a community in Christ and can strengthen our bonds as a church. Too, she hopes a membership of a younger generation will grow St. Luke's. Now that is passion. —*Bonnie Watters*

Christian Symbol: Tongues of Fire



Reminiscent of the Pentecost account in Acts 2 when "tongues of fire" rested on the disciples' heads as the Holy Spirit birthed the church, images of flame symbolize the Spirit. Sometimes a tongue of fire is paired with a dove and set on a red background—other symbols of the Holy Spirit. Fire may also indicate spiritual fervor and zeal in a Christian's life.

Operation Christmas Child & Other Needs

Thank you very much to Belinda Worth for the big bags of hand knit dolls! Some of them will be going into the *Operation Christmas Child* shoe boxes and some of them will be sent to Africa for kids with AIDS to cuddle! In Africa, 500 children a day are orphaned due to AIDS, poverty or both. Why not put a smile on a child's face and knit or crochet an 8 inch square to be made into a blanket or a handmade toy for a child to cuddle? We can always use hand knit or crocheted winter hats made for an adult sized head (I'm told these children have large heads), a sweater vest, sweaters, 8-inch squares (to be made into blankets), and handmade dolls or animals.

We have 20 squares already but need a lot more as 35 squares will make one blanket. We also have 2 hats ready to go. Winter in Africa is quickly approaching. There is a great need for knitted or crocheted Cuddles which is like a big sleeping bag for babies. If anyone is interested in making one of these, I have the patterns.

We need lots of help with *Operation Christmas Child*. As always, we need lots and lots of shoe boxes either cardboard or plastic, all with lids. These are harder and harder to come by so any you could donate to us are greatly appreciated. We can use many more covers and plastic lids for games and could use anything you may have to fit inside the boxes like clothes, school supplies, toys, etc. These items do not need to be new BUT they need to look new.

April Vestry Meeting Highlights

St. Luke's Vestry met on April 18. Because of a lengthly agenda and the need to discuss the pending retirement of the Rector, the **April Focus Topics** of Music and Altar Guild were postponed. **Peter Rosengarten**, on behalf of the Finance Committee, reported that we are OK at the moment, with pledges at 25% for this quarter, and in the same general position as last year.

- There was no Rector's Report since Paul was not present. He had been asked not to attend the meeting because of the agenda discussion concerning his retirement and a parting gift from the parish. **Senior Warden, Kathryn Wright**, reported she has notified Bishop Eli, as required in writing, concerning Paul's retirement.
- Junior Wardens' Report: Andrew Pennell explained that the hot water heater failed and was replaced at a cost of \$1400 and the two furnaces have been cleaned and are in good shape. He detailed a list of substantial tasks for Green-Up Day on May 6 following the 10:00 a.m. service. Tasks include raking gravel from the grass, planting Pat Saul's memorial tree, and installing an outdoor light near the parking lot and path. Volunteers will be urged to bring tools and participate in the work. The Inn Victoria will repair the damage to the church's lawn once their workers there have finished that backyard landscaping next door.
- Kathryn asked for **copies of past minutes** since they are presently missing. Anyone with the books or copies of old minutes is requested to contact her. Lillian Willis will create a book of minutes and LITS for year 2012. Kathryn will contact Lew Watters to see about videoing Paul's remaining sermons, as well as gathering information from the one he preached about the founding of St. Luke's.
- The main topic of the evening was **Paul's resignation**. This included discussion of an appropriate farewell gift and a celebration in gratitude for his 10 plus years as our rector. The initial details of the search process and the need to secure clergy to cover services when Sanford will be out of town was discussed briefly. Kathryn will call the Diocesan office to arrange for Bishop Thomas Eli and Canon Lynn Bates to meet with the Vestry as soon as possible so we can have a better understanding of the process and can begin to put the next steps into motion. - Lillian Willis reported on the successful LEGO Contest held at Willard Hall on Saturday April 14. (See the article and photos on pages 1 & 3.)
- The Vestry Retreat will replace the May Vestry Meeting on Friday and Saturday May 18 and 19. The main topics will be the details of a farewell celebration for Paul's ten years at St. Luke's and the steps in the search process for his successor. —Lilian Willis, Recording Secretary/Clerk

This being the end of the first quarter, you can see that income is just slightly above 25% while expenses are below that. \$875 was added to Restricted Income with \$775 of that raised for PINS at the Maple Fest Dinner and the other \$100 a Memorial gift for the Memorial Garden. As you can see none of this money has been spent as of 3/31. In March there was also a new water heater purchased and installed in Willard Hall which is not on this report since it is considered equipment and shown on the balance sheet. —*The Financial Committee*
