Thoughts On Stewardship



Like many of us, I sometimes wrestle with "The Great Stewardship Divide"—the chasm between my ideal of a year-round "attitude of gratitude" and a regular rendezvous with budgetary gridlock, especially during budget development time in the church year. Will the financial numbers add up? How do I say the numbers don't matter

when I know they do? More importantly, how well do I trust God to really know my needs and provide for them? This is a Spiritual Slippery Slope for many of us.

Jesus talks a lot about money, wealth and its use, but how easy it is to ignore those teachings because it can make us uncomfortable. A few years ago, I decided to embrace the subject of "Stewardship" as one of my personal spiritual growing edges. Since it takes about seven miles of ocean to turn an ocean liner, it would surely take the same kind of time, persistence, patience and

practice to shift my personal beliefs and attitudes toward something more in tune with God's abundance and my response to that generosity.

So, as you consider your own financial pledge to God's work at St. Luke's this next year, I offer you a few thoughts for your prayerful decision making.

• "God's abundance is always at work"—It takes time and awareness to cultivate a deeper appreciation of how God's abundance operates. A few years ago, I would pass a random apple tree every day that was growing right alongside a corn field. No one was tending it but each year, it was chock full of ripe apples. At some point one tiny apple seed sprouted and grew into this tree that blossomed in beauty every spring—nested the birds of the air as they raised their young—supported colonies of honeybees with the pollen in its flowers—fed random wildlife and spilled over itself in bearing fruit every year. It is a stewardship sermon in action

as it just sits there quietly along the road minding its own business. It is God at work in the world about us and we don't have to do a thing to make that happen. God's abundance is a gift that keeps on giving—how can we not give back in thankfulness once we see it?

- "Is my giving Faith-based or Fear-based?" Am I giving based on what I think I can I afford to squeeze out of the family budget—which is a scarcity mentality—or do I put the emphasis into giving thanks for all I have been given? Try this experiment: Give what makes you feel good about your giving this year and trust that you will not go without. You will be surprised at how giving generously in gratitude to God will have its positive outcomes in your own life.
- "Pledging is Promise Keeping" Your pledge matters. It is an indicator that you care about what happens at St. Luke's and is a significant step beyond merely putting money in the plate on Sunday mornings if you happen to be present. It is your deeper spiritual pledge to God to "keep the lights on" spiritually and literally. If you don't pledge yet, consider giving it a try this year—whatever amount brings you joy. If you do pledge, consider increasing your pledge by some amount whether a percentage or a fixed number... again...whatever would bring you joy in some way.
- "God loves a cheerful giver" but regardless of what you do in supporting St. Luke's, God will still love you anyway. Giving back to God, however, in thanks for what God has already given you just might be a spiritual stretch that will bear much fruit in your life in some new ways.

Almighty and Loving God, whose generous grace has given us all that we possess and all the good and loving things that surround us. Help us, we pray, to be mindful of your lavish abundance so we never forget the promise you place in our hands when we give back that which you have so lovingly given to us. In the name of your Son, Jesus Christ who showed us how to live a life filled with your abundance. Amen.

In Memoriam: Willard "Bud" Watson, Jr.

May 28, 1928 - October 19, 2013

Bud Watson was a wonderful ambassador for the Lord. Always smiling with a twinkle in his eyes, he warmly greeted parishioners and guests alike as they entered St. Luke's Church for Sunday morning worship—always impeccably dressed with suit jacket, tie and shinning shoes. Bud could also be relied on to greet and chat with customers at the annual Fall Tag Sale (something he loved

doing.) He'd arrive early in his pick-up truck and help haul donations to and from the sale, then spend the entire day until mid-afternoon, truly in his element. Did you ever wonder how that 18-ft beautiful Christmas tree magically appeared each year on

December 24th? Bud got his son, John, to help him find and cut down the perfect tree on his property in Perkinsville (it had to be tall!) then load it on his truck to deliver to the church.

Bud was born in Bridgeport, CT and grew up in the nearby town of Nichols. His family owned and ran a successful store, Watson's Dry Goods Store (originally started by his great-grandmother) in Bridgeport. His father later expanded it to include men's clothing. Bud went to school locally and later graduated from Kimball Union Academy in Meriden, NH. He attended the University of Bridgeport for 2 years before being called into the service. During one of his family's summer vacations at Lake Morey in Fairlee, VT, he met "a cute little blond waitress, Joanie," whom he later married and raised a family of four children. (They celebrated their 62nd wedding anniversary on June 15, 2013.) At the end of his service in 1953, the couple returned to Connecticut and Bud went to work at his father's store, but most of his career was spent on the road

selling men's clothing. His gifts were well suited for sales and he enjoyed a long career. In 1969 the Watsons moved to Springfield, VT. Bud retired in 1980 and became actively involved in many community service venues and also a member of St. Mark's Episcopal Church. Through a series of events, he later transferred his membership to St. Luke's. Bud served on the Vestry as Junior Warden and was the capable Clerk of the Works for a major Willard Hall renovation in 1999, as well as continuing to serve as an usher and greeter on Sundays.

Declining health this past year kept Bud from attending church and he died peacefully on October 19 at the age of 85. At his Memorial Service at St. Luke's on October 25, the pews were filled to overflowing with family and friends. In the eulogy his son, Willard "Chip" Watson, III quoted his father as always saying, "I've never met a stranger." What a beautiful tribute to this servant of God who touched so many lives with his love and his joy of living. We will all miss Bud, but know that he is joyfully continuing on his journey right along side the Lord. —Pat Fromberger

What's Next in the Rector Search?



Your Ministry Discernment Committee is now fully engaged in drafting the Parish Profile, which will be posted on the church website for prospective rector candidates to learn about our community of faith. To do this your committee has scheduled weekly meetings to study the relevant statements and responses you provided at the History Night held back in May,

minutes from the Joint Vestry/MDC meeting held in June, and the All Parish Appreciative Inquiry held at the beginning of September. How do the parish responses best fit each of the 12 key questions shown below? The italicized Diocesan directive to us gives you an idea of the challenge the committee faces in writing this narrative.

In our baptism we promise to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ, seeking and serving Christ in all persons. You are invited here to reflect on your ministry by responding to the following questions using approximately 1200 characters each. You may answer in multiple languages, if appropriate. (Attach a sheet with the answers to these questions)

- Describe a moment in your worshipping community's recent ministry that you recognize as one of success and fulfillment.
- 2. How are you preparing yourselves for the Church of the future?
- 3. Please provide words describing the gifts and skills essential to the future leaders of your worshipping community.
- 4. Describe your liturgical style and practice for all types of worship in your community.
- 5. How do you practice incorporating others in ministry?
- 6. As a worshipping community, how do you care for your spiritual, emotional and physical well-being?
- 7. How do you engage in pastoral care for those beyond your worshipping community?
- 8. Describe your worshipping community's involvement in either the wider Church or geographical community.
- 9. Tell about a ministry that your worshipping community has initiated in the past 5 years. Who can be contacted about this project?
- 10. What is your practice of stewardship and how does it shape the life of your worshipping community?
- 11. What is your worshipping community's experience of conflict? And how have you addressed it?
- 12. What is your experience leading/addressing change in the church? When has it gone well? When has it gone poorly? And what did you learn?

The bidding of our St. Luke's Discernment Prayer seems poignant just now—"We open our hearts to you, God. We open our hearts to each other."

October Vestry Highlights

Organizing for the busy season ahead, the Vestry heard from Bonnie and Lew Watters about their efforts to promote St. Luke's through Communications and Publicity and our website and from Pat Fromberger regarding the publications she creates to inform and connect our parishioners and friends. An update was given on our finances. Approval was given for a new light to illuminate the back walk and parking-lot entrance and for the hiring of a new Church Musician.

Communications and Publicity. Bonnie Watters reviewed the impressive number of media outlets she and Lew utilize: 17 different contacts, including websites; State Chamber listings; posters at four VT Welcome Centers and various area locations; two sandwich boards at Watters and Harrison houses for events; email blasts to parishioners (almost 90% of parish uses email); plus a new rack card she is designing for 2014 events and services. The two state highway signs for St. Luke's at \$250 each have been funded for 2013, but the need for them and that expense will be reviewed in 2014.

Website. Lew Watters submitted a report that focused on the website's most popular pages (music, events, worship, fellowship, outreach) and two web services that allow him to track popular topics and see when the spikes in visitation were geared to seasonal activities and events. He can also track where the hits come from and show interest, as after the ad for the Church Musician was placed on the Diocese and Episcopal network websites. The possibility of a future Blog was mentioned.

Publications (LITS, bulletins, directory). Pat Fromberger reported the LITS mailing list is down, reflecting loss of some church members. She reported that a Sunday service bulletin (by season) is being considered for Rite II services. This might help reduce cost and labor of producing weekly bulletins. An updated parish directory may be delayed until a new rector arrives.

Finances. Both pledges and plate offerings are behind those for last year at this time. The Finance Committee will look into the matter to see why the number of pledge units has decreased and also ascertain the cost of heating the church in the winter months to see if we can afford to reinstitute winter services in the church.

New Light for back walkway. The Vestry approved up to \$1000 as a capital expense to fund wiring and purchase of a new lamppost with sensor to illuminate the back walk near the parking area. The light should make meetings and events at Willard Hall safer and more inviting.

New Church Musician. The Vestry will offer the position to Jacob McLaughlin.

Next Vestry Meeting. Join us on Monday **November 11** at **6:00 p.m.** for an action-packed meeting that will include updates on the Ministry Discernment process and discussion of the preliminary budget for 2014. —*Lillian Willis*

Five Saints In My Life

My website doll blog is called Connections, and since 2009, I have been writing about owners and their dolls that cause stirrings. Having just celebrated All Saints' Day, I could not stop thinking about five women in my life for their special connection to me.

I start with my birth mother, Lorena, a gospel singer and humorist. She was Roman Catholic and more than anything in life she wanted to be a mother. The doctor warned her that it might not be a good thing. But she was steadfast. During my birth, the doctor saw apparent danger and asked my father, "Who should I save?" My father said, "Go back in there and save them both." I was born bearing the scar of a cross on my arm from the surgery to save me from my dying mother. Her qualities are evident in my girls.

Lew's mother Marie (so named the lady with the blue hair by Kate) never met baby Kelly. Lew was walking in the door with a Polaroid to snap a picture of the treasure, as the call came that his mother was gone to God. We all stayed behind when Lew got on the plane to attend her funeral in Colorado in October 1975. Having just gotten my driver's license, I agreed to take his turn as lector and remember, in tears as I read, one 4-year old holding one of my legs, the 2-year old the other, with Baby Kelly in my arms. It touched me to connect with her as I read that Sunday surrounded by her love treasures.

Helen Aspden was always a light for me—teaching me about the Altar Guild and hospitality. She was proud of our stewardship of saving fuel and worshipping in Willard Hall in winter months. As it happened, the furnace died the morning she did on March 12, 1989. But my favorite story to share is about Kara, locking herself in the church bathroom for a half hour during Kelly's baptism party on the lawn. We could not lure her out. Helen volunteered. "Kara, I hear you are wearing a very pretty dress. Can you come out so I can see it?" Then a click, out she came, all smiles." Saint Helen.

Sweet Kathleen Whalen, bound to a hospital bed in her living room for months, valiantly fought the poison of cancer spreading through her like fire. Always alert and joyful for visits of guests, daughter Kara and I went by one Sunday with William, then five and Gurion, four. There in the bed with her was a baby lamb. Do they still remember that moment? Yes, they thought she was a shepherd like Jesus.

Then there is Doadie—proxy grammy, confident, believer and incredible artist. Her art graces our home in many rooms. When we redecorated our living room about ten years ago, we found a note from her. She had slipped into the house and sat in a favorite chair in the afternoon light. "I cannot believe the beauty, color and warmth of this place. I stayed an hour. Thank you." Bless you, Doadie, for your beautiful art, full of love and grace like you.

To finish these recollections, I would share that my sweet sister-in-law Nancy just "returned" to us the pastel portrait of my father, Francis, as a two-year old. The presence of this masterpiece in our family hall gallery brings to mind that without him, I would not be, and without the inspiration of these five saints, I would be empty.
