CREATION PAST AND ONGOING Tense Matters in Theology

Genesis 1:1 in the New Revised Standard English translation reads: "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth," making it an accomplishment in the past. Past tense, "created," is also used in the Revised English Bible from the United Kingdom, in the Roman Catholic New American Bible, and in the New International Version. And then we come to the Jewish



Publication Society English translation which translates Genesis 1:1 thus: "When God began to create heaven and earth...," breaking the past tense pattern in English. The Jewish Publication Society English translation was published in 1985 and 1999. The newish English translation, the Common English Bible published in 2011,

duplicates the JPS translation, except for making heaven plural: "When God began to create the heavens and the earth." Both the JPS translation and the Common English Bible offer a note indicating the past tense version as an option.

Those of us who gather for a revised and augmented prayer for "the start of day" have been encountering in its Affirmation this description of God's creating: "We believe in God who has created and is creating...". I called attention to that tense difference, in our conversing time at the close of our morning liturgy, to creation as not only an accomplished event in the past, but rather as an ongoing activity of God with us, in us, in our midst as co-creators. Sean Whalen of our morning "start of day" prayer group remembered to me and us that I had worked with tense in the sermon for Sunday, January 22, noting Jesus' frequent statement that the kingdom of God is near, really meaning here, now, with us as its inhabitants and co-creators with the God in Christ who continues to create in and with us.

2023 ANNUAL MEETING

St. Luke's 2023 Annual Meeting was convened on January 22 and immediately recessed to reconvene on Sunday February 5 to allow time to complete, print, and distribute the Annual Report. Please see page 6 of this newsletter for the Communications, Publications, and Publicity report that was inadvertently omitted from the Annual Report booklet.

Other clarifications to the Annual Report's agenda are that in the Vestry Class that ends in 2023, Beth Salisbury will not seek reelection to a 3-year seat, but Belinda Whipple Worth and Lillian Willis will run for reelection, while Sean Whalen will run for a new 3-year term. Therefore the new Class of 2026 for the Vestry is proposed as Belinda, Lillian, and Sean. In the class of 2025, Colleen Garvey and Eileen Widger were appointed by the Vestry to complete the 3-year terms when Janet Hunter and Meredith Wagner resigned in 2022. Colleen and Eileen need to be approved by parishioners at the Annual Meeting. Nominations may be taken from the floor for membership on the Vestry or for the proposed Finance Committee.

Volunteers will also be sought to help with a number of events and fundraisers. Treasurer John DesLuriers will explain the budget for 2023, and members of the Vestry will be on hand to answer any questions parishioners may have for them or for Bruce McDuffie, Transition Minister.

We sometimes get stuck in longing for the way things were in some non-existent idealized past. Because it is what we grew up with it must have been the way God intended it to be. It can be scary to have creation and growth as an ongoing blessing of the God in Christ who comes to open our eyes to the light. So, no change except in the direction of the way it was when I felt more in control. "Don't face me with a new and expanded vision of God." "Don't expose me to new hymns that preach along with the scriptures." "Don't face me with my wish to be in control." We might say all those things to ourselves as the psalms and hymns and some of the recent Isaiah readings give us mirrors on the wall, mirrors we might rather cover over with pleasant scenery. Certainly not with knowledge that much of our "control" attitude creates a society where sometimes gun violence obliterates the loving selves we were created to be.

But now, in mid to late Epiphany as we gift each other with more of God's light and hold each other in the light, we have the blessed opportunity to grow together. It is work, work that we are given the rest of Epiphany and Lent to undertake. And indeed, all of our lives. It is work we find it difficult to undertake, but also find in the midst of the frustration and pain, even when we disagree, that we are with each other. In that with-each-otherness we discover Emanuel, God with us.

It is a weekly blessing, a place of comfort, inspiration, and stability to those who enter its doors and even to those who merely pass by this beautiful place. ALTAR GUILD OPPORTUNITIES

The first months of a new year are a good time to think about your activities for 2023. Eileen Widger, Directress of St. Luke's Altar Guild, would like you to consider some ways you can help St. Luke's offer beautiful, spiritual, and smoothly-run worship services.

One easy way is to donate to the Flower Fund, which provides bouquets for the altar on the Sundays we are upstairs in church. You may contribute any amount at any time to St. Luke's by indicating Flower Fund in the memo line of your check. In addition, during the growing season, people with gardens may donate flowers for the two service vases by arranging ahead of time with Eileen when the flowers will be delivered, so that Eileen doesn't have to place an early flower order. Still another option is to sponsor flowers for a particular Sunday service by reserving a special day of the year through the Altar Guild and sending a \$30 check for each service you would like to sponsor in honor, celebration, or memory of someone. Both the donor and honoree will be announced at the service, and the donor may take the flowers home after the service or give them to the honoree, a friend, an ill parishioner, or anyone who would welcome a tangible celebratory gift or a sign of thought and good wishes.

A second way to help St. Luke's is to become a trained member of the Altar Guild and assume preparatory duties for a service and its closing tasks. Duty times are scheduled in advance. There are written guidelines for those responsibilities, and training is provided by a present Altar Guild member. Although the initial training may take only 30-60 minutes – depending upon the number of questions asked – the goal is to make sure each new member is confident in his or her duties and clear about the responsibilities. (By the way, all ironing duties are performed by Angel Eileen.)

Eileen would be happy to answer any questions you may have about reserving a special day for flower sponsorship or about the special services which Altar Guild members perform. Theirs is an important ministry that a person can offer to St. Luke's. Please contact Eileen at 802-875-4604 or at tewidger@gmail.com for more information. St. Luke's Light in the Shadows Newsletter (LITS)

The mission of LITS is to reflect St. Luke's Statement of Purpose: "St. Luke's is an intentional Christian community, deepening faith and broadening love." Light in the Shadows (LITS) was created and published by Pat Fromberger until her death in 2021, when I took over the assignment. LITS continues to be regularly published once a month and disseminated – since the start of Covid – in a PDF form that allows it to include more color photos and to be both printed and made available online. The bulk of copies are sent via email to 62 individuals in the parishioner email group and to 28 Friends of St. Luke's, who include philosophical supporters, former parishioners, and several former rectors. The PDF format and online access allow faster delivery and provide greater flexibility in design, while saving on costs for paper, printing, and postage. We encourage people to read the newsletter via the email attachment or online or to print a copy on their home printer. If a computer or printer is lacking, anyone may ask me to print a copy on my home printer and mail it to him or her. At present a hard copy of the newsletter is mailed monthly to two parishioners.

LITS has become an increasingly important source for community information and inspiration. It is a way to keep abreast of St. Luke's activities and can be a wonderful way to reconnect with old friends as parishioners move away for various reasons. That is why every email announcing the latest LITS includes a plea for information and photos. Just because parishioners may have moved far away doesn't mean that they are out of our thoughts or that we have ceased to desire details on how they are doing. Please submit information so we can keep our St. Luke's family well informed about present and faraway friends and family, as well as parishioners. We appreciate hearing from those who may not be attending church here regularly. Frequently emails or telephone calls attest to the importance of the newsletter's extended information that helps make LITS a unifying presence that transcends constraints of time and place.

Other Publications

Toward the end of 2021 and throughout 2022 it was Supply Priest Bruce MacDuffie's preference that he prepare and print an inclusive bulletin, including hymns, for each church service. Each bulletin is available on the church website and is made available to those who wish to participate in the service by Zoom.

Many thanks to David Carey and Marti Assenza for posting the newsletters, weekly bulletins, notices, and reports of meetings and services on the church website and to David Carey, in particular, for Zooming services and Vestry meetings throughout the year when he is available. Online access to services and meetings has made it possible for those out of town or hindered by bad health or bad weather to participate.

Other parish events, and their pre- and post-publicity, posters, reports, and photos, as well as bulletins for memorial services, were regularly prepared and printed by this editor.



Having just finalized the Treasurer's annual report in preparation for our annual meeting I can report we finished the year on a solid financial footing. As noted in my annual report narrative our overall income was within 2% of budget while our expenses were 27% below budget (largely in part to having Supply Clergy vs. a full- or part-time Rector. As a result of these savings, there was no need for any funds from our investment portfolio to be used as budgeted.


